



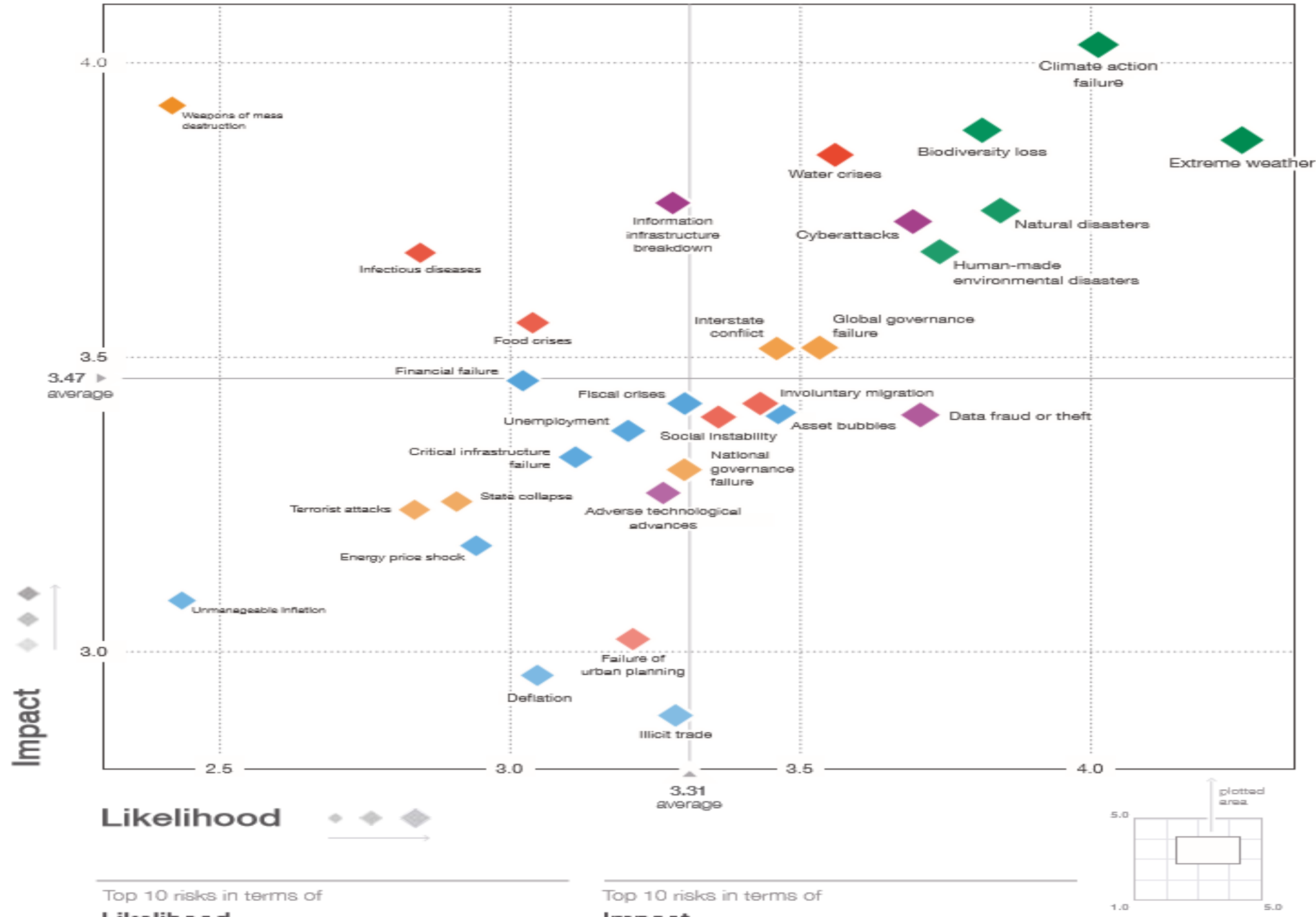

FY19 CARBON FOOTPRINT



Water:

614 litres per m²
50-70% water from recycled source

Waste:

16 tonnes total per year
77% recycled

Business travel:

Air – 309 tonnes CO₂e
Road – 8 tonnes CO₂e
Rail – 33 tonnes CO₂e

Energy:

667,000 kWh per year
171 tonnes CO₂e

Paper, timber & print:

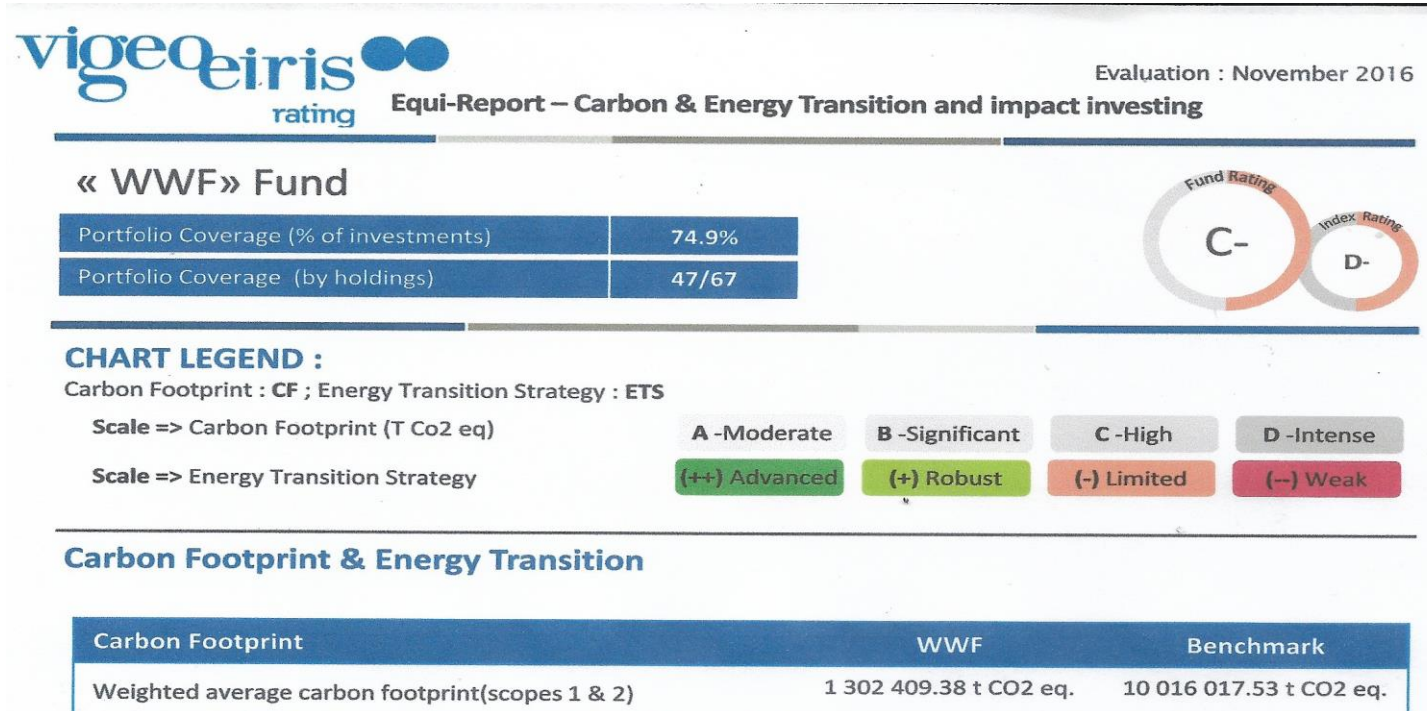
121 tonnes CO₂e
99.6% sustainably sourced
3.6 sheets printed per person per day

Plastic:

Removed all *avoidable* SUP by 2020
>300kg SUP left to remove

ENVIRONMENTAL TARGETS



REDUCE OUR ROAD AND RAIL BUSINESS TRAVEL EMISSIONS BY 46.2% BY FY30 USING 56 TONNES OF CO₂e AS OUR BASELINE



REDUCE OUR BUSINESS AIR TRAVEL EMISSIONS BY 46.2% BY FY30 USING 309 TONNES OF CO₂e AS OUR BASELINE



REDUCE OUR ENERGY EMISSIONS BY 46.2% BY FY30 USING 171 TONNES OF CO₂e AS OUR BASELINE



RECYCLE AT LEAST 84% OF OUR WASTE PER YEAR



REDUCE OUR FOOD WASTE BY 50% BY 2023 USING 7.6 TONNES AS THE BASELINE



ERADICATE ALL AVOIDABLE SINGLE-USE PLASTIC IN OUR PRODUCTS, OPERATIONS AND SUPPLY CHAIN



USE ≤450 LITRES OF WATER PER M² PER YEAR



USE 100% RECYCLED OR FSC CERTIFIED MATERIAL FOR ALL PAPER AND TIMBER
REDUCE OUR PAPER AND PRINT EMISSIONS BY 46.2% BY FY30 USING 121 TONNES OF CO₂e AS OUR BASELINE



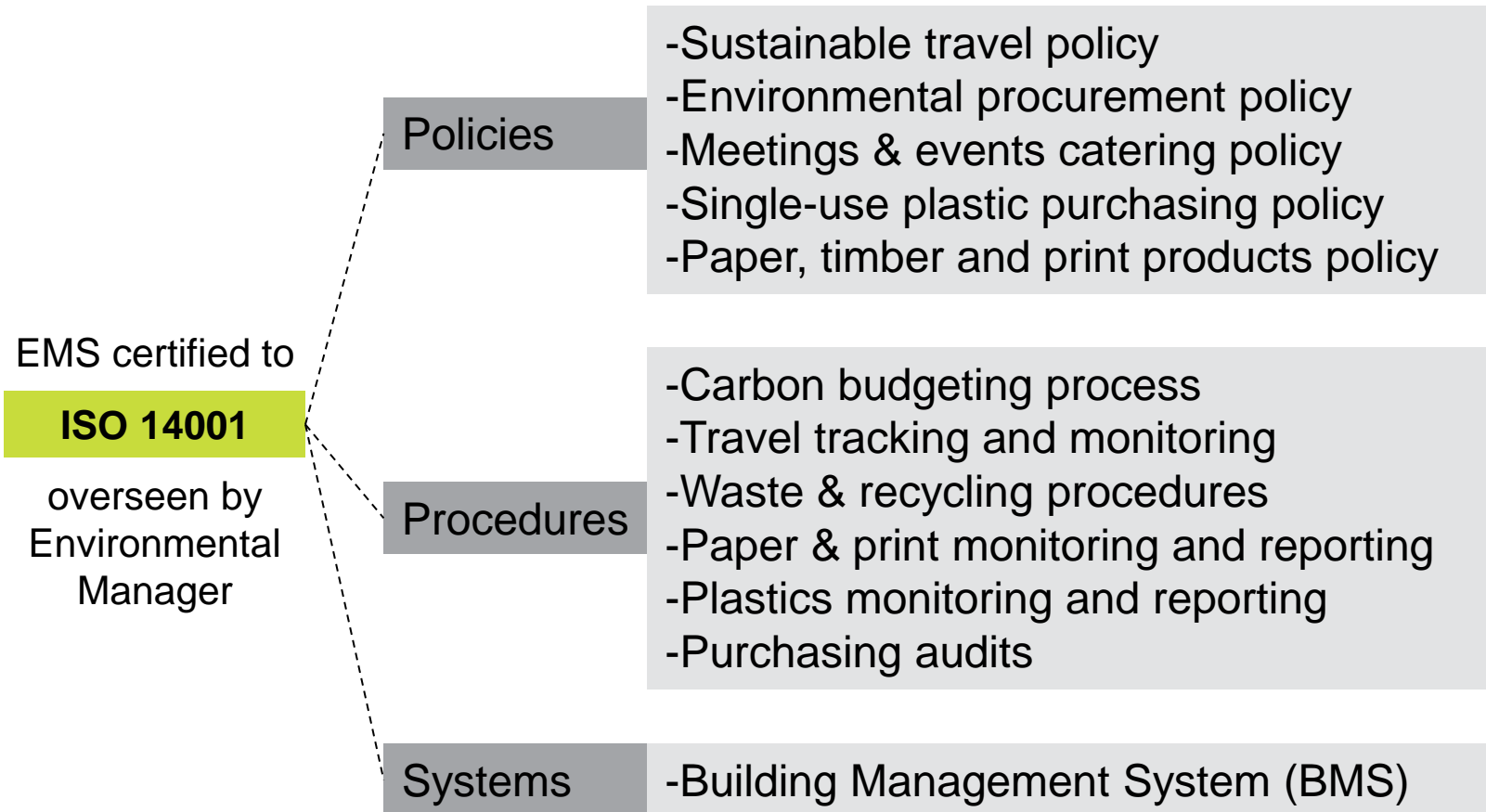

SUCCESSES/CHALLENGES

SUCCESSSES

- ✓ Setting SBTs for emissions
- ✓ BMS sub-metering – efficient identification of issues, monitoring and reporting
- ✓ Living Planet Centre – low impact building
- ✓ Net zero organisation
- ✓ Very high recycling rate
- ✓ Rainwater harvesting
- ✓ Solar panels with internet access (accessed by WWF network)
- ✓ Staff enthusiastic about environment – makes behaviour change easier
- ✓ Able to share and receive best practice with WWF network

CHALLENGES

- × Greywater system suffers challenges – parts wear and sediment build-up, requires maintenance
- × Encouraging reduction of travel can create tension amongst staff
- × Cost vs. environmental credentials – tight margins jeopardise environmentally preferable options
